A special meeting of the Town Board of the Town of Palmyra was called by the Supervisor for Thursday, February 29, 1968, at 7:30 P.M. at the Town Office for the purpose of considering:

1. Presentation by Gokey Real Estate on appraisal of the Town of Palmyra properties.
2. Request from four residents of Howell Street to annex to the Village in order that they could obtain water.
3. Request of Orville Marquart to establish another Mobile Home Park and any other business that might come before this Board.

W. Ray Converse, Town Attorney and William Craw also were present at this meeting.

Supervisor called the meeting to order and then turned it over to Mr. Gokey and Mr. Stanwix, the appraisers. They submitted in detail their qualifications and procedure in the performance of both their field work and office work and further stated that they would have Mr. Damuth, a qualified architect, do the Garlock Inc. The figure they quoted to appraise the town, including photographs of every home was \$38,500.00

After they were dismissed, Mr. McGonigal gave a report of the other companies that he has contacted. The American Appraisal Co. Inc. are not active in valuation of municipalities, The Thorne Appraisal Service Inc. of Binghamton, N.Y., as well as the Cole, Laver, Trimble Co. of Dayton Ohio and the J.M. Cleminshaw Co. of Cleveland, Ohio are not in a position to do appraisal work because of other commitments. However, the United Appraisal Co. is interested and Mr. McGonigal will contact them and arrange for a meeting with them at our next board meeting, March 14th, if possible.

Discussion then held on the Mobile Home Park that Mr. Marquart wished to establish. Clerk instructed to write him a letter advising that he must submit detailed plans and make application for special authorization to the Town Board per Section 7.1 and 8.6 of the Zoning Ordinance.

Annexation of the four residents on Howell Street into the Village was discussed. Mr. Converse, Town Attorney, suggested that we take this up with the Village before any action is taken.

Mr. David VanderMolen, Marion Road, requested permission to build a show room for his trailer sales business on property that he is acquiring from Donald Jeffery.

Mr. Converse advised that he be informed that he must make application in triplicate and since he does not own the property at the time of making application, the signature of Donald Jeffery is also required on the Application. This is submitted to the Zoning Enforcement Officer but since it must be denied by him as its a use not permitted in a district zoned Agricultural, he then will have to petition the Board of Appeals for a variance. Petition for a variance shall be accompanied by a fee of \$25.00 payable to the Town and presented to the Town Clerk.

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No further business appearing, Mr. White moved the meeting be adjourned, seconded by Mr. LeRoy. Carried. Meeting adjourned at 10:45 p.m.

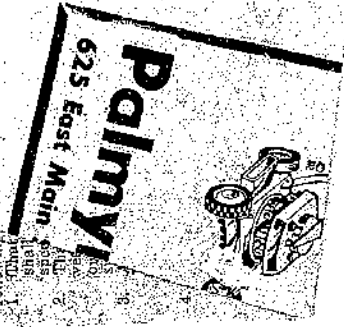

AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE REGULATING THE HAULING AND DISPOSAL OF GARBAGE AND RUBBISH.

In order to promote the health, safety and welfare of the residents of the Town of Palmyra, the following amendments to the ordinance enacted January 15, 1953, regulating the hauling and disposal of garbage and rubbish are hereby adopted.

1. From this time on the public dumping ground on the Garnsey Road shall be known as the PUBLIC SANITARY LAND FILL, and no person other than residents of the Town of Palmyra, displaying on the rear view mirror of the car facing the windshield a sticker (to be renewed annually) issued by the Village of Palmyra shall dispose of refuse, rubbish or garbage on said Sanitary Land Fill, and then only at the days and hours established by the Village of Palmyra.

2. No person, partnership, corporation or association shall dispose of refuse, rubbish or garbage on the Sanitary Land Fill except by entering the gate through the fence.

3. No person shall dispose of any matter by throwing it over the fence at the Sanitary Land Fill Site.

4. To make use of the Sanitary Land Fill commercial haulers (persons hauling for hire) shall be licensed by the Village of Palmyra and no such hauler shall operate without securing the license of a commercial hauler; such license to be renewed annually.

5. Prohibited Material.

No person shall dispose of any of the following refuse on the Sanitary Land Fill.

1. Rubber, plastics or solvents.

2. Poisonous acids, infected materials, dead animals or parts thereof, or explosives.
3. Stumps, tree trunks, tree limbs and brush except at the direction of the attendant.

6. The penalty set forth in the original ordinance shall apply to a violation of this amendment.
7. This amendment shall take effect 10 days after publication thereof in the Palmyra Courier Journal.

Reasons for opposing as stated by Mr. Garland were: 1. traffic hazard, 2. reduction of nearby and adjacent property value, 3. inadequate municipal service, pictures were also submitted by Mr. Garland showing his present mobile home park as viewed from Maple Avenue as well as buildings of Mr. Marquart on Maple Avenue (statement of Mr. Garland filed). Melvin Smith is concerned with water and sewage problem that might result from a 40-unit mobile home park. Hudson VanBortel abuts the present park and objects to refuse that results from this park, he also stated that some have been placed illegally as boundary distances have not been observed. Others felt that a mobile home park brings in a transient class with a great turn-over, thus adding nothing to Palmyra from an economic standpoint. Mr. Compton and Mr. Smith feel that this is farming land and wish it to remain as such.

Those expressing opinions in favor of the park were: Clyde Smith, Raymond Cornelius, Mr. Bromstrup and Mr. McPike. (Mr. and Mrs. Oville Marquart also present).

Mr. Clyde Smith noted the fact of being called transients or people of lower income bracket. He stated that 50% living in trailers are as sound and secure as anyone here.

Mr. Raymond Cornelius reminded the board of the economic value resulting from additional families coming into Palmyra and felt that any additional expense borne by children of those families is off-set by the amount of money that is spent in this area, and as for a great turn-over, he feels that there is very little difference in turn-over between houses and mobile home and that housing is something for all to be concerned with. Mr. McPike also speaking in favor of the park reminded the board of the economic value that this park would bring in. Mr. Brumstrup stated that he now resides in a trailer park run by Mr. Marquart and feels that he operates a very good park, his supervision is real strict and certainly feels that the community will be helped greatly by allowing this park and requests the board to consider very seriously of approving it.

After all persons were heard, Supervisor McGonigal thanked the people for coming in and expressing their views and then declared the hearing closed. Hearing closed at 8:35 P.M.

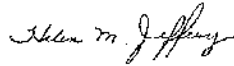

1 MR. MCKEOWN: We are here tonight
2 for the purpose of a hearing with regard to Richard C. McGonigal's
3 petition for annexation of certain property in the Village of
4 Palmyra. The first order of business is to elect a chairman
5 for this meeting. Do I hear any nominations?

6 MR. SCHWING: I would like to
7 nominate Hart B. Pierce, Jr.

8 MR. GREEN: I second the nomination.

9 MR. MCKEOWN: Everybody in favor?
10 (Whereupon all say "yes.") Any oppose? (Whereupon no one
11 said "no.")

12 MR. NESBITT: It might be helpful
13 if the stenographer has who is present at the hearing and if
14 the various men would tell their name for the Record. (Where-
15 upon the following men give their names to the stenographer:)
16 Hart B. Pierce, Jr.

17 MR. PIERCE: The first order of
18 business will be the members of the Village Board: Roger
19 Schwing, Claire Reynolds, Merrick Cook, Lloyd Green, Arthur
20 McKeown.

21 MR. PIERCE: Members of the Town
22 Board: Harry White, Andrew Baran, Hart B. Pierce, Jr.

23 MR. MCGONIGAL: I want it noted for

1 the Record that I'm not serving this evening on the Town Board.

2 MR. PIERCE: The meeting will come
3 to order and the first order of business will be the introduc-
4 tion of the petition.

5 MR. CONVERSE: Could I have the
6 notice of publication offered as an exhibit?

7 MR. HART: There has been offered
8 here the proof of the publication by the Town of Palmyra and
9 proof of mailing. Does anyone want those read, anybody present
10 want those read otherwise they will be submitted as Exhibit A.
11 (Whereupon there was no objection to having them submitted as
12 Exhibit A and Exhibit A was so marked)

13 MR. NESBITT: Could I present some
14 matters for the Village?

15 MR. HART: Yes.

16 MR. NESBITT: I would like to have
17 marked and introduced in the Record as Exhibit B the petition
18 which the Village of Palmyra received, executed by Richard C.
19 McGonigal in relation to a proposed annexation. (Whereupon
20 Mr. Nesbitt reads said petition to the Town and Village Boards)
21 This is a certified copy of the petition. Annexed to it is a
22 legal description and a proposed map and I offer this in
23 behalf of the Village of Palmyra which will be Exhibit B.

1 I also offer proof of a mailing which is annexed to that to the
2 Town of Palmyra School District and ask that it be marked
3 Exhibit C and D and a proof of publication in the Palmyra
4 Courier Journal which would be Exhibit E. I also ask to be
5 part of the Record, which would be Exhibit F, an affidavit of
6 the clerk setting forth April 9th as the date of receiving the
7 application. She received it and also an affidavit that the
8 Village Board received this on April the 16th. It was pre-
9 sented to them by the clerk. I would also like to have as
10 Exhibit G a notice received in relation to objections to this
11 petition by Charles McLouth, Jr. and it be made a part of the
12 Record and I hereby submit that. (Whereupon the aforementioned
13 items are so marked)

14 MR. HART: Anything else to be
15 introduced? (Whereupon nothing else was introduced)

16 MR. CONVERSE: That is all at this
17 time.

18 MR. HART: The meeting is open for
19 anybody present to testify or offer anything they wish to,
20 CHARLES MCLOUTH, first having been duly sworn by Hart B. Pierce,
21 Jr. testified as follows:

22 MR. MCLOUTH: Mr. Chairman and
23 members of the boards, I'm here for clarification purposes and

1 the only reason I'm here is - and the only reason that I have
2 filed objections to this proceeding is for clarification
3 purposes. Under the statute as I understand the applicable
4 sections of the General Municipal Law, objections have to be
5 filed in writing and that's the only basis upon which I may
6 justifiably be heard. I object in the first instance to the
7 petition in this proceeding on the grounds that it does not
8 appear that the petitioner, Mr. McGonigal, is the owner of this
9 property. Whether that is required under the statute, that is
10 a matter for somebody to pass upon other than I. I own pro-
11 perty on East Foster Street and there's a lot that is in the
12 Village of Palmyra and in back of it is land which I own
13 which is in the Town of Palmyra and it goes halfway up the
14 north side of Bear Hill. The property which I own is in the
15 rear of houses that are on the south side of East Foster Street
16 except the lot which fronts on East Foster Street and is part
17 of the Village. But, my land in the Town of Palmyra is in
18 back of the houses up on East Foster Street and the tax bills
19 which I have received for a number of years indicate that my
20 property is bounded somewhere - and I assume on the west - by
21 land which was once owned by Mrs. Cruikshank who is Mr. McGoni-
22 gal's aunt. There is no reference anywhere that I can see that
23 Mrs. Cruikshank has conveyed this property to Mr. McGonigal or

1 that he is vested with the record title to that property that
2 we are talking about. I'd like to know whether the land, the
3 subject land, bounds my property on the west or whether it
4 doesn't. I have been led to believe over the years that my
5 property was bounded on the west by land owned by Mrs. Cruikshank
6 who is Mr. McGonigal's aunt as I say and who may have conveyed
7 the property to Mr. McGonigal or - there is no direct or indirect
8 reference to that fact in the moving papers here. Now, there
9 is a map that is annexed to and made a part of the petition
10 in this proceeding which says that the subject land - that is,
11 the land sought to be annexed to the Village of Palmyra - is
12 bounded on the east by land now or formerly owned by John and
13 Laura Todd. Now, John or Laura Todd never owned it. My
14 father owned it for a number of years. It was devised under
15 his will to my mother and under my mother's will was devised
16 to me. Now, I'm here not to cause difficulty but I want to
17 know where I stand. My property has never been surveyed. I
18 do think that the westerly line - this is supposition - without
19 any survey or confirmation - I do think that the west line of
20 this subject property is my east line and that John and Laura
21 Todd never owned the land which I own and if the west line of
22 the subject property that Mr. McGonigal seeks to annex to
23 the Village was once owned by John and Laura Todd and the notice

1 of annexation published in the papers describe the land con-
2 veyed as along some degrees and some minutes and so forth -
3 along the west line of land now or formerly owned by John Todd.
4 Now, John and Laura Todd never owned any of my land. My land
5 has not been surveyed. I have paid taxes to the Town of
6 Palmyra and upon a representation to me that my land was
7 bounded on the west by Cruikshank property. The most recent
8 Town tax bill that I have paid indicated that my land was
9 bounded on the west by McGonigal property. I don't know any-
10 thing that has happened between Mrs. Cruikshank and Mr. McGon-
11 igan and it's probably none of my business but I want to
12 know where I stand. I want to know - want clarification and I
13 want accuracy and if the east line of the subject property is
14 my west line, I want to know it. If the east line of the
15 subject property is the west line of land owned by John and
16 Laura Todd, I want to know that too because John and Laura
17 Todd - if it be their west line - they have sold land which is
18 all locked in and no access to East Foster Street or Canandaigua
19 Street or any other. I have served this village. I think
20 McGonigal is my friend. I don't want to cause any trouble but
21 I want clarification. All I want to know is in the first
22 place - I have objected here because it's not indicated and
23 the attorneys representing the Town and the Village can pass

1 upon that as to whether it's necessary. There's no direct or
2 indirect reference to the fact that Dick McGonigal is the
3 record owner of this property now and there's no direct or
4 indirect reference to the fact that he might have procured it
5 by proper conveyance from his aunt, Mrs. Cruikshank, to all of
6 which I have no objections if the land is accurately described
7 but I don't think that that - that this survey which is
8 attached and made a part of the petition and if Dick McGonigal
9 got a deed from Mrs. Cruikshank pursuant to that survey, I
10 think he got a bum deal. That's the way I feel about it
11 because - that's all supposition on my part because I have
12 paid taxes for years and years on my land bounded by Cruikshank
13 property. The last bill I paid was bounded by McGonigal which
14 leads me to think that possibly Mrs. Cruikshank conveyed the
15 property to Mr. McGonigal but there's no reference to that.
16 What's the harm? There's no reference in the petition or else-
17 where that this property was conveyed by Mrs. Cruikshank to
18 Mr. McGonigal in liber so and so and so and so and not answer
19 just the provisions of the State that the petitioner owns
20 twenty per cent or something of that type. Let Dick McGonigal
21 step forward and say "I own this property and it was conveyed
22 to me by deed dated so and so and recorded so and so and liber
23 so and so in the Wayne County Clerk's Office." That's all I

1 want to know, yes. Let's get - I don't want the Village of
2 Palmyra to go off half cocked here if that's a potential and I
3 don't want to go off half cocked here either because I want
4 to know whether land that adjoins my land on the west, if
5 it's next to the Village of Palmyra if it's part of the Village
6 of Palmyra. Thank you very much.

7 MR. MCGONIGAL: I do want to recall
8 for the benefit of you people something that Mr. Nesbitt read
9 from the petition in which I stated that I am the owner.

10 MR. CONVERSE: Paragraph 3. The
11 petitioner here is the owner of the majority in assessed valua-
12 tion of property in the said territory.

13 MCLOUTH: Why not say the owner of
14 the whole bunch.

15 MR. MCGONIGAL: I believe in the
16 original letter I wrote upon which the petition was made, I
17 stated that I was the owner of the property. I have here a
18 Deed dated October 4, 1963 conveying the property from Grace
19 D. Cruikshank to Richard C. McGonigal, liber 521, pages 447,
20 448 and 449. This I would be glad to submit to the chairman
21 for observation. I would like it back.

22 MR. NESBITT: I think it ought to
23 be made a part of the Record. Have it introduced and a part of

1 it. (Whereupon Hart B. Pierce, Jr. marks Mr. McGonigal's
2 Deed to said property as Exhibit H)

3 MR. MCGONIGAL: In the map which I
4 submitted which is also a 1963 map of a survey of the property
5 conducted by Harnish and Lookup of Newark, the property owned
6 by me is accurately outlined and the particular area that I
7 own is described in there. I asked Harnish and Lookup whether
8 they do survey any property adjoining mine or anyone else's
9 when they make a survey of an individual's property. They told
10 me that they made no attempt to survey in Court records any
11 adjoining properties. That would add to the expense to the
12 owner of the property for whom they were making the survey
13 and the owners of the property were only interested in their
14 particular piece of land. They also told me that it was their
15 usual practice to use language similar to that in the Deed from
16 which they were working. I have no knowledge of whether John
17 and Laura Todd ever owned any property east of the property
18 that I now own. I do recall that my aunt, Mrs. Cruikshank, bought
19 this particular piece of property from John and Laura Todd
20 without any surveys of adjoining properties. I believe that
21 point is immaterial to the particular annexation of this
22 property which I feel is surveyed properly and mapped properly
23 in so far as the property that I own is concerned. In so far

1 as the technicalities of these matters, I leave it to the judg-
2 ment of you gentlemen, including the respective attorneys.

3 Thank you.

4 MR. HART: Thank you Mr. McGonigal.

5 MR. NESBITT: Have you, since you
6 received this Deed which you have in evidence here as Exhibit H,
7 conveyed out any part of the property or all of it to anybody
8 else?

9 MR. MCGONIGAL: No.

10 MR. NESBITT: As far as you know,
11 were you the owner of record at the time you executed the
12 petition?

13 MR. MCGONIGAL: I am.

14 MR. NESBITT: No other questions.

15 MR. MCLOUTH: May I see that Deed?

16 (Whereupon Mr. McLouth examines Mr. McGonigal's Deed)

17 Is this the same description that's published, Bud?

18 MR. MCGONIGAL: I can't answer
19 that truthfully. I have not compared them and I would assume
20 that in that Deed, part of the description covers an area
21 that is already in the Village because in this entire property
22 a certain amount is in the Village and a certain amount in the
23 Town. I believe the map shows it.

1 MR. MCLOUTH: The map likewise
2 shows this subject property being bounded on the west by land
3 now or formerly owned by John Todd.

4 MR. MCGONIGAL: On the east.

5 MR. MCLOUTH: Bounded on the west,
6 this subject property of Mr. McGonigal bounded on the west by
7 land now or formerly John and Laura Todd. Now, I don't think
8 that was ever John and Laura Todd's. I think it's mine and as
9 I stated before, I would like very much to question the authen-
10 ticity or accuracy of a survey made by Mr. Lookup. However,
11 it wasn't made by him. It was made by somebody in his office.
12 I don't find in this Deed this course that is described in the
13 newspaper.

14 MR. CONVERSE: It naturally
15 wouldn't be because part of that is in the Village of Palmyra
16 and what was in the Village of Palmyra was not included in
17 this description. You will note the place there where it
18 stops going east and goes south -

19 MR. MCLOUTH: But in the publication,
20 Ray, the notice -

21 MR. HART: Where is any reference
22 to the east line of the Todd property? I'm looking at the
23 notice of hearing that was published in the papers and I don't

1 see any reference to the west line or the east line of the
2 Todd property.

3 MR. MCLOUTH: Look in the middle
4 of it half way down. (Whereupon Mr. Hart looks at the notice
5 of hearing that was published in the papers.)

6 MR. HART: Along the west line of
7 lands now or formerly of John and Laura Todd. Let me show you.
8 This is showing this description. (Indicating) We are going
9 down this way, easterly, along this course here behind these
10 houses on Foster Street. Then, it's coming up here along
11 the west line of land formerly owned by Todd and the Todds.
12 did own this land. (Indicating) It's not referring to this
13 property. (Indicating) It didn't say along the east line,
14 isn't that right?

15 MR. MCLOUTH: Along the west line
16 now or easterly of John and Laura Todd to an iron pipe set on
17 the northerly line of Bear Hill subdivision. You're going
18 this course here now. (Indicating) The description is dif-
19 ferent as published in the annexation, without having more time
20 to study, than is in Dick McGonigal's Deed. In the published
21 notice, the course that is described is this course here.
22 (Indicating) That's some degrees along the land now or former-
23 ly - along the westerly line of land now or formerly owned

1 by John and Laura Todd. That's my land.

2 MR. CONVERSE: It goes along the
3 south line of the Village of Palmyra from the point of beginning
4 to the west line of John and Laura Todd, cutting out all that
5 part of the description which lies north of the south line of
6 the Village of Palmyra.

7 MR. MCLOUTH: You can't go along
8 the westerly line now or formerly owned by John Todd.

9 MR. CONVERSE: This is the way the
10 survey has set it out. Whether this is right or not, I don't
11 know. You don't have your Deed here and you don't have any
12 description.

13 MR. MCLOUTH: I have paid taxes
14 for years bounded by Cruikshank property and I assume that
15 when Mrs. Cruikshank gave Dick McGonigal the Deed, that she
16 gave him a Deed of all she thought she owned there.

17 MR. CONVERSE: That's right, that
18 little part in the Village of Palmyra as well as all of this
19 in the Township outside the Village.

20 MR. MCLOUTH: I don't know where
21 the discrepancy arises. I don't think this map is accurate.
22 I don't think that that line (indicating) is the west line of
23 land now or formerly owned by John and Laura Todd. Maybe it is.

1 MR. CONVERSE: At least the
2 surveyor thought it was.

3 MR. MCLOUTH: That may be so. I
4 don't want any misunderstanding here or lack of accuracy here.
5 I want to know, Ray, whether my land bounds the subject land on
6 the east.

7 MR. MCKEOWN: I don't know the
8 legal technicalities of this situation but if that map describes
9 the most eastern - eastern most boundary of the property under
10 discussion this evening, what relevancy does it have as far
11 as this meeting is concerned as to who does own the land to
12 the east of it?

13 MR. MCLOUTH: Only to the extent
14 of clarification and accuracy. If the Village Board and if
15 the Town Board don't think it makes any difference, it doesn't
16 make any difference to me except that I would like to know -
17 after this job is accomplished, if this annexation is accepted
18 whether my land is bounded on the west by Village property.

19 MR. MCKEOWN: Isn't this outside
20 the province of the Village and Town Board at this point?
21 Isn't this something you would have to decide for yourselves?

22 MR. MCLOUTH: I merely call it to
23 your attention because I served on the Village Board too. I

1 don't want you to do a bum job here or an inaccurate job here.
2 If the subject property which Dick McGonigal seeks to annex to
3 the Village, if this property is bounded on the east by my
4 land, I want to know it and I want the Village to know it and
5 I want the Town to know it.

6 MR. CONVERSE: The McGonigal
7 property goes a certain distance to the east and it doesn't
8 make any difference as the Mayor suggested to my mind who is
9 east of that a certain number of feet to the east boundary line
10 of the land which we propose to put in the Village and on a
11 certain course and I can't see that it's relevant.

12 MR. MCLOUTH: It certainly is
13 relevant, Ray, if the map is made a part of the moving papers
14 here and it's represented on that map that is land now or
15 formerly owned by John and Laura Todd which I don't believe
16 could be the facts. That's all.

17 MR. CONVERSE: It may be that the
18 surveyor put down the wrong person but whoever it is, that's
19 where that line is.

20 MR. MCLOUTH: That may be where
21 the line is but according to the notice you published, you
22 describe a course - I don't see it in Dick's Deed, but you
23 describe a course along the west line of land now or formerly

1 of John and Laura Todd to an iron pipe set on the northerly
2 line of Bear Hill. Now, that's not adequate or proper or a
3 lawful description of the land if John or Laura Todd now or
4 never did own the land. I only ask for accuracy and clarifica-
5 tion and that's all I'm seeking here. I have no ax to grind.
6 I have no reason for being antagonistic but I do think that the
7 moving papers here are of such a nature that either the Village
8 or the Town or somebody apart from me should find out whether
9 or not this is an accurate description. When you annex some-
10 thing to a Village, you want to know where your west line is.

11 MR. CONVERSE: We know where our
12 west line is.

13 MR. MCLOUTH: The east line I'm
14 talking about, of the subject land is what I'm talking about.
15 The west line of my land.

16 MR. CONVERSE: It says in the
17 description there it's the same property conveyed to Cruikshank
18 conveyed by John Todd.

19 MR. MCLOUTH: It doesn't say any-
20 thing about being conveyed to McGonigal.

21 MR. HART: I think we understand.
22 Do you have anything to add Mr. Nesbitt:

23 MR. NESBITT: No.

1 MR. HART: Mr. Converse?

2 MR. CONVERSE: No.

3 MR. HART: I think the Boards have
4 in mind the issues that you are raising. Do you have anything
5 else you would like to say?

6 MR. MCLOUTH: No, except I do
7 invite clarification and I guess I have made that clear.

8 MR. HART: Anything else?

9 MR. MCLOUTH: I have nothing more,
10 Mr. Chairman. I think that I will leave you gentlemen now.
11 (Whereupon Mr. McLouth leaves the room where the hearing is
12 being held)

13 MR. HART: Does anyone?

14 MR. GREEN: I have read the Deed
15 and every place the Deed very well describes the bounding
16 property except to the easterly which is in question now. I
17 haven't studied what was printed in the newspaper but there's
18 a possibility of just I think an error here and the name and
19 the name that was put on the map. I think it's as simple as
20 that.

21 MR. HART: Well, the Boards have
22 ten days -

23 NESBITT: The Boards have a

1 period of ninety days in which to make a decision. It must be
2 made within that period of time. The ten-day period of time
3 is when you can adjourn this hearing but if it's closed tonight,
4 the Boards have a ninety-day period to make a decision. We
5 don't have anything on the Record in relation - I might
6 suggest that possibly we might have something on the Record
7 here as to whether it would be a good public policy for the
8 Town Board and the Village Board or one or the other - in
9 relation to whether it would be of public benefit to the Village
10 Board or Town Board or both to have the annexation. This will
11 have to be a part of - maybe Mr. McGonigal would testify to
12 that.

13 MR. MCGONIGAL: I thought maybe
14 Mr. McLouth thought the meeting was over. I don't want to
15 take any benefit of the absence of his presence other than to
16 reiterate that Harnish and Lookup in making the survey does
17 not vouch for the accuracy of the names on adjoining property.
18 Frequently they put "Reputed owner so and so." In fact that
19 was the reason I had to visit them yesterday. I had them make
20 a survey of my aunt's property on the west side of Canandaigua
21 Road directly opposite that and on the south. They said the
22 property was reputedly owned by Robert Manning and I knew
23 right then that it was owned by Hart B. Pierce, Jr. so I had

1 them correct it. Now, another thing. I still think the fact
2 that they put on there that was now or formerly owned by John
3 and Laura Todd is irrelevant because the property is staked
4 out, it's mapped out and the property I own is the one in
5 question. Now, as to the benefit of the annexation, in my civic
6 and municipal jobs and in the action of the present Village
7 Board which I believe has appeared in some notices in the
8 press, I feel and agree with them that they need to enlarge the
9 Village where and when they can in order to get a broader tax
10 base. As you know, they are pretty well hemmed in and built
11 up on the property now in the Village and that to me is the
12 benefit to the Village, of broadening the tax base. To the
13 Town, I cannot see myself - and speaking only for myself - I
14 cannot see any particular benefit to the Town other than the
15 fact that in annexing property to the Village, the Village
16 sewer system would be available to that property and could
17 cause an earlier development of that property thus adding to
18 the tax base of both the Town and the Village. Thank you.
19 That is all I have.

20 MR. CONVERSE: The idea would be
21 that it would benefit the Town because of the addition of
22 dwellings that are contemplated to be put there.
23

1 MR. MCGONIGAL: If and when they
2 are put there. Temporarily, it's a very minute loss to the
3 Town.

4 MR. CONVERSE: As a matter of fact,
5 it isn't a loss to the Town.

6 MR. NESBITT: Without pinning it
7 down definitely, do you have any specific plans at this time
8 as to - in the event there was an annexation in relation to
9 the property other than the general proposal of construction?
10 I think you said housing.

11 MR. MCGONIGAL: As soon as this -
12 if it's annexed - I propose to write the Village Board request-
13 ing what the zoning is for. I would want it to be residential.
14 I have an idea of selling it outright maybe later if I did not
15 sell it outright, developing it myself or I might wind up by
16 leaving it to my heirs. My request will probably be for an
17 R2 zone.

18 MR. NESBITT: I would like to ask
19 one other thing. At the beginning, you said you were not
20 participating. Is the reason because you are a supervisor and
21 also the petitioner?

22 MR. MCGONIGAL: Yes.

23 MR. NESBITT: I have no further

1 questions.

2 MR. HART: Anyone else?

3 MR. CONVERSE: Are we going into
4 executive session on this now or are we going to wait?

5 MR. NESBITT: I don't know but
6 I'm not prepared to pass on the petition now. I'm not saying
7 it's not all right but I would like to make a memorandum to
8 the Village in view of the fact that we have objections here.

9 MR. CONVERSE: I have no objection
10 if that's what you want to do.

11 MR. NESBITT: I could have it

Following is the Amendment to Ordinance regulating the hauling and disposal of garbage and rubbish:

In order to promote the health, safety and welfare of the residents of the Town of Palmyra, the following amendments to the ordinance enacted January 15, 1953, regulating the hauling and disposal of garbage and rubbish are hereby adopted.

AMENDMENT TO
DUMP ORDINANCE

1. From this time on the public dumping ground on the Garnsey Road shall be known as the Public Sanitary Land Fill, and no person other than residents of the Town of Palmyra, displaying on the rear view mirror of the car facing the windshield a sticker (to be renewed annually) issued by the Village of Palmyra shall dispose of refuse, rubbish or garbage on said Sanitary Land Fill, and then only at the days and hours established by the Village of Palmyra.

2. No person, partnership, corporation or association shall dispose of refuse, rubbish or garbage on the Sanitary Land Fill except by entering the gate through the fence.

3. No person shall dispose of any matter by throwing it over the fence at the Sanitary Land Fill Site.

4. To make use of the Sanitary Land Fill commercial haulers (persons hauling for hire) shall be licensed by the Village of Palmyra and no such hauler shall operate without securing the license of a commercial hauler; such license to be renewed annually.

5. Prohibited Material.

No person shall dispose of any of the following refuse on the Sanitary Land Fill.

1. Rubber, plastics or solvents.
2. Poisonous acids, infected materials, dead animals or parts thereof, or explosives.
3. Stumps, tree trunks, tree limbs and brush except at the direction of the attendant.
4. Paper or paper products unless bound and tied in a manner suitable to prevent dispersal by wind and elements.

6. The penalty set forth in the original ordinance shall apply to a violation of this amendment.

7. This amendment shall take effect 10 days after publication thereof in the Palmyra Courier Journal.

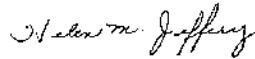

B. The following officers and agencies of the Town of Palmyra shall under command of the Chairman, County Board of Supervisors and guidance of the County Office of Civil Defense, direct and coordinate performance of the specific emergency Civil Defense functions as follows:

1. Town Clerk:

Preserve town records, disseminate Civil Defense instructions through the use of all available town news and communication media. Assist the County Treasurer to take measures necessary to stabilize prices, wages, salaries and rents, to ration essential consumer items, and to support indirect monetary, tax and credit measures adopted by the Federal Government.
Town Constable

2. Assist the County Sheriff and Civil Defense Auxiliary Police in maintenance of law and order including protection of life and property, regulate and control traffic, direct the injured to medical installations and homeless to welfare installations, and provide assistance to handicapped persons by obtaining transportation and directing them to suitable reception and care installations.

3. Superintendent of Highways:

Clear debris, perform highway and bridge maintenance and emergency repair, rehabilitate vital community services, post on suitable maps current information regarding the town situation as it affects essential facilities and public services.

4. Chairman Town Planning Board:

Assist the Zone Civil Defense, Zone No. 3 in assessing damage as a result of nuclear effects. Provides maps and plotters familiar with the town and plots areas destroyed and estimates remaining resources.

5. Superintendent of Water Districts:

Assists the Planning Board Chairman in assessing damage to water distribution and sewage systems within the town. Provides maps and assists in plotting and reporting damage to Zone Number 3 Headquarters.

6. Civil Defense Administrator:

Insures that training is available at Zone Number 3 Headquarters Operations. Schedules and assists in conducting emergency training for volunteers to augment existing services.

C. All town officers shall report to the Town Hall or other designated location when so directed by the Town Supervisor or upon such directive issued subsequent to the sounding of the alert signal.

D. This Executive Order No. 1 shall become effective immediately.

The collector or receiver is required to state separately, under the heading "Revenues," the anticipated income of his office during the ensuing year from "Interest and penalties on taxes" and the "Fees of tax collector."

If taxes are collected by the local collector without fees, no amount should be stated under the item "Fees of tax collector".

In towns in which the office of tax collector has been abolished and the town clerk collects taxes, the estimate of the town clerk should include, under the heading "Revenues" two additional items — "Interest and penalties on taxes" and "Fees of tax collector."

In towns of the first class where the office of receiver of taxes is appointive and the town clerk is also the receiver of taxes, the estimate of the town clerk should also include the two additional items hereinbefore referred to.

A Public Hearing on the Preliminary Budget was held on Thursday, October 31, 1968, at 7:30 P.M. at the Town Office.

Present: R. C. McGonigal, Supervisor
Harry K. White, Town Justice
Raymond LeRoy, Town Councilman

James DeBrine, jr., Highway Superintendent also present.

Supervisor called the meeting to order and announced that a public hearing had been called for at this time and place on the preliminary budget and that all interested persons would be heard at this time.

Clerk presented and read proof of publication.

Charles Richardson appeared before the board regarding the budget figure for ambulance service. He said he felt that \$2000.00 would be needed for the first six months to get the service on the road and pointed out the fact that only \$1000 had been placed in the budget. Further stated that after the first six months it probably would be run on a donation basis or possibly an annual drive once a year.

Board assured him that \$1000 could be transferred from the contingent fund if needed.

He also noted the fact that an open meeting will be held on November 12 at the highschool auditorium and requested the Town Board to have a letter at that time stating just what the town will do.

The combining of the two governmental units - willage and town- was discussed at some length. Supervisor asked for volunteers to make a study in this matter.

The problem of water for outside the corporation as well as what can be done to attract new industry was also brought up.

Supervisor stated that the Town Planning Board, the County Director along with a representative from an engineering firm are looking into the possibilities of getting a water supply from a source and that the County Economic Director is working on the possibilities of getting new industries in Wayne County and since the County is working on this, there is no need for a town to spend money on it.

Bill Bonner noted the fact that he would like to see a percentage value of 100% used instead of the 80% of full value which the board had agreed to in their October meeting.

After all persons desiring to be heard were heard and no one opposing the budget, the Supervisor declared the hearing closed.

Mr. White moved the adoption of the following resolution which was seconded by Mr. LeRoy:

WHEREAS, this Town Board has met at the time and place specified in the notice of public hearing on the preliminary budget and heard all persons desiring to be heard thereon now therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that this Town Board does hereby adopt such preliminary budget as originally compiled as the annual budget of this Town

for the fiscal year beginning on the 1st day of January, 1969, and that such budget as so adopted be entered in detail in the minutes of the proceedings of this Town Board, and be it.

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Town Clerk of this town shall prepare and certify in duplicate, copies of said annual budget as adopted by this Town Board, together with the estimated, and deliver one copy thereof to the Supervisor of this Town to be presented by him to the Board of Supervisors of this County.

Supervisor announced the resolution carried by a vote of 3 ayes and no nays.

He gave an estimated cost of \$760,000 for converting present system to his proposed system, with 60% state aid cost would be \$340,000. His presentation was followed by question and answer period.

Dear Mr. Hahn:

Following your request at our October Board Meeting that something be done to improve the road or land adjacent to your home, I have had discussions with the State Department of Canal Lands and our Superintendent of Highways.

The State does not assume any responsibility for maintenance of such roads on canal lands and the Town had neither the responsibility nor the right to perform any work on State land or undedicated private roads and lanes.

The same rules apply throughout the entire canal system and even around the lakes. I know that at Canandaigua Lake the property owners by tracts form associations with each property owner paying his proper share to keep the roads in good condition and clear. Just west of Macedon along the canal they do the same thing/

Therefore, the solution is for the property owners along your lane to band together and pay a private contractor to put your lane in good condition and keep it clear and in good shape the year around. As far as mail delivery is concerned I believe you could put up a row of mail boxes at the entrance to the lane. This is common throughout the countryside.
