The 2001 and 2006 ambulances were declared surplus and a resolution was passed to work with Teitsworth Auctions, Geneseo, to have them listed in an online auction, November 3 – 10. The website for the auction is www.teitsworth.com They, by the way, are the people who handle the very successful annual Town auction which draws people from all over the state and beyond. Finally, the board voted that the proceeds from the auction will be placed in the Fire Department Equipment reserve, to be used only for that purpose. The contract with Teitsworth is written so that the buyer pays the premium (cost) of participating in the auction, not the seller, which in this case is the Village of Palmyra.
